Interpretation Guide

Registration as a Pharmacy Student

To register as a pharmacy student in Newfoundland and Labrador, applicants must meet the following requirements:

- The applicant must be currently enrolled in an accredited Canadian University pharmacy program.
- The applicant must provide a certificate of conduct, in accordance with NLPB's *Certificate of Conduct Requirements for Registration*.
- The applicant must submit a completed "Application for Registration as a Pharmacy Student", along with the appropriate fee and supporting documents¹ including:
 - A professional liability insurance coverage certificate, indicating current coverage in accordance with NLPB's *Professional Liability Insurance Requirements for Registration*; and
 - Government-issued photo identification in accordance with NLPB's *Photo Identification Requirements for Registration*.

Once the above steps have been completed and all documentation has been received, the applicant's file will be reviewed to ensure that all requirements for registration in Newfoundland and Labrador have been met. The applicant will be notified once a final decision has been made.

Pharmacy Students are reminded:

- Registration of a pharmacy student confers upon the student the right to perform tasks within the scope of practice of a pharmacist, but only under the direct supervision² of a pharmacist.
- Practice experience placements in Newfoundland and Labrador may only be completed by pharmacy students registered with NLPB.
- Only a registered pharmacy student enrolled in an accredited Canadian University pharmacy program and registered with NLPB may identify themselves as a pharmacy student in Newfoundland and Labrador.
- Pharmacy students must identify themselves as a pharmacy student when communicating or working with the public, other pharmacy professionals, or members of other health professions.

¹ Supporting documents must be provided in accordance with NLPB's *Scanning Guidelines and Checklist for Document Submissions*.

² When providing "direct supervision", the pharmacist must be present when the activity is being performed and be able to observe and promptly intervene and stop or change the actions of the individual being supervised.
